CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION:

Pastor: The holy Word of God always points us to Jesus, my friends, and throughout

this new year of grace the Scriptures will reveal Him to us as the Lord Almighty, our Friend and Redeemer, the Servant of God and Savior of sinners,

the coming King, to Whom all glory and praise belong.

People: Yet in our sinfulness we often fail to recognize our Lord's approach and

give Him the honor and worship He deserves. We allow earthly concerns—joys and sorrows, fears and needs—to claim our attentions and cloud our

vision. We need someone to re-focus our hearts.

Pastor: That's exactly what the Holy Spirit does, beloved! By prophecy, psalmody,

epistle, and gospel He directs our hearts toward the Son of God. Of His pure grace the Spirit opens our eyes to see and believe what the manger and cross disguise and what Satan wickedly conspires to hide and deny: That the infant Child of Bethlehem Who grew to be the Man of Calvary and rose again as the Mighty Victor over sin and the grave is the long-promised Messiah, the One anointed by God, through Whose life, death, and resurrection our transgressions are pardoned and our places in heaven guaranteed. As a called and ordained minister of this gospel and by the authority the risen Christ bestowed on His Church, I, therefore, forgive you all your sins in the

name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

THE OLD TESTAMENT READING: Isaiah 64:1–9

Oh that You would rend the heavens and come down,

that the mountains might quake at Your presence—

as when fire kindles brushwood

to make Your name known to Your adversaries,

When You did awesome things that we did not look for,

EPISTLE READING: 1 Corinthians 1:3–9

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that was given you in Christ Jesus, that in every way you were enriched in Him in all speech and all knowledge—even as the testimony about Christ was confirmed among you—so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift, as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who will sustain you to the end, guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful, by whom you were called into the fellowship of His Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Lector: The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the 11th chapter:

GOSPEL READING: *Mark* 11:1–10

When they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of His disciples and said to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately.'" And they went away and found a colt tied at a door outside in the street, and they untied it. And some of those standing there said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" And they told them what Jesus had said, and they let them go. And they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it, and He sat on it. And many spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut from the fields. And those who went before and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the highest!"

People: Praise to You, O Christ!

Lector: We confess together our Christian faith, using the Apostles' Creed

CONFESSION OF FAITH: The Apostles' Creed
